Most of the concepts that nowadays are associated with the constitutional identity of the EU have been developed in the context of free movement law. Developments taking place in the field of free movement law are therefore often regarded, and rightly so, as the litmus test for the progressive development of EU law at large.

Recent events such as Brexit and the new wave of protectionism embraced by the Trump administration had the potential to be disruptive for the European integration process.

Yet, they seem to have strengthened rather than weakened the commitment of the EU and the Member States towards the unity and inseparability of the common market.
