Biographies

Amina Augie worked in the Office of the President of Nigeria as Senior State Counsel, and as a Lecturer at the Nigerian Law. She became a Chief Magistrate in 1988, has served at the High Court in 1992. In 2002, she was appointed as a Justice of the Court of Appeal where she spent 14 years before starting her current position in the Supreme Court of Nigeria in 2016.

Rebecca Badejogbin is a qualified legal practitioner in Nigeria. She holds a doctoral degree in Private Law from the University of Cape Town, South Africa and is currently a Deputy Director of Academics at the Nigerian Law School where she has lectured since 2001.

Freya Baetens (*Cand. Jur./Lic.Jur. (Ghent); LL.M. (Columbia); Ph.D. (Cambridge)*) is Professor of Public International Law at the PluriCourts Centre of Excellence (Faculty of Law, Oslo University), working on an interdisciplinary research project evaluating the legitimacy of international courts and tribunals. She is also affiliated with the Europa Institute (Faculty of Law, Leiden University). As a Member of the Brussels Bar, she regularly acts as counsel or expert in international disputes. She is specialised in the law of treaties, responsibility of states and international organisations, law of the sea, WTO and investment law, energy law and sustainable development.

Rosemary Barkett has served as a Judge on the Iran-United States Claims Tribunal since October 2013 in addition to accepting private arbitration appointments. Previously, Judge Barkett served on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit, and was the first woman Chief Justice of the Florida Supreme Court.

Daniel Behn is Lecturer in Law at Liverpool Law School and Senior Research Fellow at PluriCourts. He is an Associate Editor for the *Journal of World Investment and Trade*. Behn's scholarship focus on the interdisciplinary study of international courts and tribunals. He has written extensively about the sociological and normative legitimacy of international tribunals with a specific focus on international arbitration. His work is empirically orientated and applies quantitative social science methodologies to the study on international adjudication.



Myriam Christ obtained her double degree BLaw/MLaw Fribourg (Switzerland) - Paris II in 2017. She is currently an intern at the ECtHR. As of March 2018 she will be studying for an additional semester at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem.

James Crawford (B.A., LL.B. (Adel.), D.Phil. (Oxon.); LL.D. (Cantab); S.C. (N.S.W.); F.B.A.) is a Judge at International Court of Justice and a former Whewell Professor of International Law at Cambridge University. He was the first Australian member of the United Nations International Law Commission and in that capacity was responsible for the ILC's work on the International Criminal Court (1994) and for the second reading of the ILC Articles on State Responsibility (2001). In 2012, he was awarded the Hudson Medal by the American Society of International Law.

Josephine Dawuni is Assistant Professor of political science at Howard University in Washington, DC. She has an LLB from the University of Ghana and is a Barrister-at-Law before the Ghana Superior Courts of Judicature. She is the Executive Director of the Institute for African Women in Law. Her latest publication is "International Courts and the African Woman Judge" (Routledge, 2018).

Fatoumata Dembélé Diarra is the President of the Board of Bamako Law University. Previously, she served as Judge on the Constitutional Court of Mali, as Vice-President and Judge on the International Criminal Court, as Judge on the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia and as Director of Justice National Administration of Mali.

Teresa Anne Doherty is from Northern Ireland is a judge of the Special Court of Sierra Leone, she was previously a judge of the High Court of Sierra Leone after the civil war. She was the first and, for 11 years the only woman judge in Papua New Guinea. She is noted for her work on woman and prisoners rights. Her judgement on forced marriage was the first declaration that it is a crime against humanity.

Catherine Drummond is an Associate in public international law and international arbitration at Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer. She advises and represents clients in relation to disputes before international courts and tribunals including the International Court of Justice, European Court of Human Rights and arbitral tribunals.

Rolf Einar Fife is Norway's ambassador to France and Member of the Permanent Court of Arbitration. He was Director General for Legal Affairs at the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs (2002-2014) and Chair of the Committee of Legal Advisers on International Law at the Council of Europe (2009-2010).

Veronika Fikfak is a Fellow and Lecturer at the University of Cambridge and an ESRC Future Research Leader. She holds a Magister Juris and a D.Phil from University of Oxford. Her research interests are in the fields of public law, human rights and international law. She is particularly interested in the interface between domestic and international law and is currently writing a monograph on the role of national judges in relation to international law for Cambridge University Press.



Andreas Føllesdal (Ph.D. 1991 in Philosophy, Harvard University) is Professor of Political Philosophy, Faculty of Law, University of Oslo and Co-Director of PluriCourts, a Centre of Excellence for the Study of the Legitimate Roles of the Judiciary in the Global Order. He was the Principal Investigator for the European Research Council Advanced Grant MultiRights (2011-16), on the Legitimacy of Multi-Level Human rights Judiciary.

Corina Heri is a Postdoctoral Researcher focusing on international and regional human rights law at the University of Amsterdam. She completed her PhD at the University of Zurich in 2017. She previously obtained her Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the University of Zurich and an LL.M. from King's College London in 2012.

Valerie Hughes is Adjunct Assistant Professor of International Trade Law in Kingston, Canada. She is the former Director of Legal Affairs Division, WTO; former Director, Appellate Body Secretariat, WTO. She also has 19 years of experience with the Government of Canada in different positions including Assistant Deputy Minister, Law Branch, Department of Finance.

Helen Keller is Professor of Public Law, European and Public International Law at the University of Zurich and serves as a Judge at the European Court of Human Rights. Previously, she was a Member of the UN Human Rights Committee.

Liesbeth Lijnzaad is judge at the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea (Hamburg). She is a former Legal Adviser of the Netherlands Ministry of Foreign Affairs and head of its international law department (2006 – 2017). From 2010 - 2015, she was the co-chair of the UNGA's Ad Hoc Open-ended Informal Working Group to study issues relating to the conservation and sustainable use of marine biological diversity beyond areas of national jurisdiction (BBNJ). She is a member of the Permanent Court of Arbitration and of the San Remo Institute of International Humanitarian Law. Professor dr E.Lijnzaad is also endowed professor Practice of International Law at Maastricht University. She studied law and history, receiving master's degrees in international law (1985) and Dutch law (1987) from the University of Amsterdam, and holds a PhD in international law from Maastricht University in 1994.

Annette Magnusson is Secretary General of the Arbitration Institute of the Stockholm Chamber of Commerce (SCC). She is the author or editor of several publications, including *Arbitrating for Peace* (Kluwer, 2017) and *International Arbitration in Sweden* (Kluwer, 2013). Spearheaded the Stockholm Treaty Lab crowdsourcing for climate change mitigation and adaptation, and the documentary *The Quiet Triumph*.

Prisca Matimba Nyambe is a retired judge of the High court of Zambia and Former Ad-litem judge of the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia. She is currently Judge of the Residual Mechanism for International Criminal Tribunal(MICT).

Hemi Mistry has been an Assistant Professor at the School of Law, University of Nottingham since 2015, having also completed her LLB, LLM and PhD at the same institution. Her research explores how procedural choices and practices within



international courts and tribunals affect the nature and quality of the 'justice' that these institutions serve.

Ozana Olariu is a young researcher in investment law and human rights law. She is currently pursuing her PhD studies and has taken a position as Lecturer in Law at the University of Granada.

Juan Pablo Pérez-Léon-Acevedo (PhD (Åbo Akademi University); LLM (Columbia University); LLB (Catholic University of Peru)) is a Postdoctoral Research Fellow at PluriCourts. He served in different capacities at inter alia the International Criminal Court, International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia, International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea, and Peruvian Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Joseph Powderly joined the Grotius Centre for International Legal Studies as an Assistant Professor of Public International Law in March 2011. Venera Seitimova is a Judge at the Court of the Eurasian Economic Union (since 2015). From 1997 to 2013 she served as a judge at national courts of the Republic of Kazakhstan. From 2013 to 2014 Mrs. Seitimova served as a Judge at the Economic Court of the Commonwealth of Independent States.

Abibatou Siby has served as examining Judge, Judge and Court President on several occasions in Senegal. She acts as expert for the World Intellectual Property Organization and was president of the African Committee of the international Confederation of societies of authors and composers CISAC.

Taylor St. John is a Postdoctoral Research Fellow, PluriCourts, University of Oslo, and a Senior Research Affiliate, Global Economic Governance Programme, University of Oxford. She recently published *The Rise of Investor-State Arbitration: Politics, Law, and Unintended Consequences* (Oxford UP, 2018).

Geir Ulfstein is Professor of Law, Faculty of Law, University of Oslo and Co-Director of PluriCourts, a Centre of Excellence for the Study of the Legitimate Roles of the Judiciary in the Global Order. He also served as Director of the Norwegian Centre of Human Rights (2004-08) and was the head of legal research in the European Research Council project MultiRights.
